2. Consideration of Proposed Ordinance No. 2038 Imposing a Temporary Moratorium on Oil and Gas Drilling, Hydraulic Fracturing, and the Processing of Certain Oil and Gas Related Applications – Second Reading

Summary

- Broomfield's regulations for oil and gas land use applications and operations were updated in 2013.
- In recent years, the conduct of oil and gas drilling and production has evolved so that consolidated well sites, with larger numbers of wells, are becoming increasingly common. This style of operation may create different potential impacts that can legally be addressed by local governments.
- Broomfield has an interest in protecting and preserving the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens.
- At present, Broomfield does not have any regulations relating to potential fees to address the impact of large scale
 drilling and production operations on roads and traffic. This is an area in which local governments have the ability to
 regulate or impose impact fees.
- A moratorium of short duration will allow Broomfield staff time to review Broomfield's existing land use regulations
 and processes, including administrative approval by memorandum of understanding, to ascertain whether any
 changes to those regulations or processes should be recommended.
- Broomfield has conducted the pre-application review for the oil and gas well development proposed by Extraction Oil and Gas Inc., on the Sheridan pad site located at the northwest corner of the Northwest Parkway and Sheridan Boulevard. This is in anticipation of the submittal of a final plan for the Sheridan pad site.
- At Extraction's request, hearings regarding their spacing applications related to the Lowell and Sheridan drilling pad sites filed with the Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission have been continued until March 2017.
- A summary of the updated proposal from Extraction Oil and Gas, Inc., regarding their proposed development of oil and gas wells at four sites in Broomfield is included as Attachment 1. This includes the Sheridan site. Extraction executives will summarize this proposal at the January 10 meeting.
- Comments received by the City and County of Broomfield regarding oil and gas operations are included as Attachment 2. Comments have been received via e-mail, social media, and from Broomfield's web site in response to requests from residents to submit items for consideration by the City Council at its 2017 Focus Session.
- Broomfield is organizing a facilitated community forum with participation by the Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, and Extraction to provide an opportunity for the City Council and residents to obtain additional information and clarification regarding oil and gas development. This is expected to occur in late January or early February.
- Proposed Ordinance No. 2038 would temporarily halt any new oil and gas drilling, hydraulic fracturing, and processing of oil and gas development applications until June 13, 2017.

Prior Council Action

The City Council has adopted moratoriums in the past. One related to development along 144th Ave., during which time the City adopted the Transitional Overlay Area District regulations. A moratorium was also adopted in 2010 to allow the City to address the issue of medical marijuana.










Updated Development Timeline: Phased approach working West to East







Mayor and City Council:

At the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem's request I formally submitted on January 3rd, a recommendation that the City and County of Broomfield ("Broomfield" or the "City") begin the process of amending the Comprehensive Plan 2016 Update (the "Plan") by adding future drilling and other oil and gas activities to the Plan. This email provides the background to such request and provides specifics for such recommendation.

BACKGROUND MORATORIUM AND MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

During my final year as Mayor, the City Council was consumed by a request for the approval of drill sites to be operated by Sovereign Operating Company, LLC ("Sovereign"). Broomfield negotiated a 2013 Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") which among other things required the adoption by Sovereign of industry best practices and allowed for the drilling of 21 wells on ten different sites.

The negotiation of the MOU was not enough to calm the concerns of Broomfield residents and in November 2013 the voters narrowly passed a 5 year moratorium on oil and gas drilling, which was subsequently overturned by the Courts.

Sovereign has now sold all of its oil and gas rights to Extraction Oil & Gas, Inc. ("Extraction").

GOVERNOR'S OIL AND GAS TASK FORCE

In response to the continuing conflict in Colorado between residential and other development and oil and gas drilling activities, on September 8, 2014 Governor John W. Hickenlooper formed the Task Force on State and Local Regulation of Oil and Gas Operations (the "Task Force").

I was appointed to the Task Force, along with 20 others. Membership including executives from numerous oil and gas companies with Colorado activities, members representing local governments and the conservation community, a former Speaker of the House and a former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

A recommendation, to be approved by the Task Force, required 2/3rd majority. This meant that a recommendation could not be adopted without the consent of the oil and gas industry.

My main objective as a member of the Task Force was to have the Colorado Oil & Gas Conversation Commission ("COGCC") pass rules to allow for local governments to include future oil and gas drilling in their Comprehensive Planning processes and Plans.

For many of the meetings I carried a large version of the Broomfield Plan Map (example attached) and pointed out to the Industry Task Force Members that Broomfield and other jurisdictions had developed Comprehensive Plans for their communities without planning for a single additional oil and gas well. Even though Broomfield, and the COGCC knew that numerous additional wells were being planned for our communities.

After considerable discussion, the Task Force unanimously adopted a very watered down Recommendation 20 which I sponsored. On February 1, 2016 the COGCC adopted Recommendation 20 which includes registration of oil and gas operators with local jurisdictions, and at the request of the jurisdiction providing local jurisdictions the "operator's current business plan . . . a good faith estimate of the number of wells the operator intends to drill in the next five years. . . and a map showing the location within the local jurisdiction of an operator's existing well sites and related production facilities; sites for which the operator has . . approved drilling and spacing orders and, sites the operator has identified for development on its current drilling schedule."

Clearly the industry understood my point, a city's comprehensive planning should include future oil and gas drilling and producing activities. The version was watered down due to Industry concerns over its implementation by counties that might have a hidden agenda.

MASTER PLAN UPDATE AND RECOMMENDATION 20

Last April I sent an email to the Broomfield staff and the Mayor and City Council, see attached recommending that they request from Operators in Broomfield the information required by Recommendation 20.

At that time the City was updating its Plan and it seemed critical to me that Broomfield consider future oil and gas wells as part of its 2016 Comprehensive Plan update. These were the exact circumstances for which Recommendation 20 was adopted.

However, Broomfield chose not to do this.

EXTRACTION OIL AND GAS

The 21 wells on ten different sites approved by Council in 2013 has now morphed into over 100 wells on 4 sites which has reignited the oil and gas conflict in Broomfield.

As you may know Extraction had an Initial Public Offering this year and in examining its SEC form S1, you can determine that Extraction is well aware of Recommendation 20 and that Extraction has identified 3,510 gross identified drilling locations in the Wattenberg which obviously includes Broomfield (see attached). In addition, Extraction has provided a Guidance Presentation for its existing and potential investors which includes numerous maps showing identified drilling locations. Look at page three of this attachment which shows numerous locations in Broomfield and adjacent to Broomfield.

Yesterday, as I was writing this I was informed that Extraction responded to a request from Erika Delaney Lew that it's five year plan includes the drilling of 171 wells. To my knowledge, none of these future wells were contemplated in the

Plan. I assume that 171 wells is based on current 12/31/2015 oil and gas pricing which was below \$40 per barrel. Today the price has increased to over \$50 and the number of "proved" wells may have increased.

In addition, we don't necessarily know if there may be additional operators, if the price continues to rise, whose wells become economic and they then plan to drill in the next five years as well.

If the Council decides to agree to my request then it is important that updating the Plan be on a comprehensive basis, so to speak. That is we attempt to identify the maximum number of wells for all operators.

FOCUS SESSION REQUEST

I am proposing herein a formal proposal that the City Council adopt as a priority for its goals in 2017 the update of Broomfield's Comprehensive plan ("Plan Update 2017").

It is my understanding that Council has unanimously approved on first reading a proposed 6 month oil and gas drilling moratorium which it will consider for final approval on January 10th. It is not clear to me what the Council plans to do during this six month period.

This is the reason I am requesting that during the moratorium Broomfield works to amend the Comprehensive Plan to provide for oil and gas drilling activities for the next five years.

The steps I recommend the City take are as follows:

- 1. Pass the Moratorium: With the explicit goal that this is being done in order to complete the Plan Update 2017.
- 2. Request from Registered Operators: As allowed by Recommendation 20 request the business plan information and maps from each of the registered operators for the next five years.
- 3. Request for Maximum Possible Wells: Also inquire of the operators, if the price of oil, increases to \$70 (or another agreed upon price) would that increase the wells to be drilled in the next five years. And if so, how many.
- **4. Search for Unregistered Operators:** Looking at Broomfield land records, identify other owners of oil and gas leases within Broomfield and notify them that this process is going on. I suspect there may be other operators that might drill in Broomfield in the next five years if the price of oil increases. Notify those operators of the Plan Update 2017
- **5.** Engage a Third Party Engineer: Similar to what City Council did in 2013, engage an independent engineer to assist in the review of the drilling, site plans and other information provided by the Operators, allowing Council to independently verify the reasonableness of some of the assumptions used by the operators. This engineer can work with the Operators to identify alternative plans.
- **6. Search for Drilling Sites:** Review the current Comprehensive Plan maps to identify "drilling islands" that can be used for the extraction of the oil and gas minerals. Obviously, sites controlled by the operators would have preference, but that is not necessarily the entire goal. This would be an iterative process with the operators. This process would involve Broomfield's Planning group, the Consulting Engineer and staff for the Operators. If there are multiple operators, Broomfield may want to request shared pads.
- 7. **Hold Public Hearings:** Once we have a tentative agreement with the operators and have identified "acceptable" drilling islands, hold public hearings letting the public know the process, the conclusion and getting their input before finalization.

8. **Legislative or COGCC Support:** To my knowledge no one has attempted this process before and Broomfield will clearly be at the forefront of planning for oil and gas operations in urban areas. I had proposed more substantive support from COGCC in my initial Recommendation 20 proposal, allowing for forced pooling, shared pads, etc. I had always hoped that if a City like Broomfield started down this path, then the support we need from COGCC or the legislature might become obvious and bipartisan.

All of these steps are proposed, but it seemed important to me that we start with a level of specificity so that Extraction and the public know that the moratorium is for a good reason. I suspect we may be able to get buy in from Extraction, other operators, and potentially COGA.

This process may not work, but if it does it could serve as a model for Colorado and urban areas across the country.

OFFER TO SERVE:

I have dedicated considerable time, as Mayor and on the Task Force, to finding resolutions to the oil and gas conflicts occurring across Colorado. I have a good relationship with the oil and gas industry and with many members of the anti-fracking community.

As a Controller, CFO and CPA I have worked with numerous oil and gas companies over the last 40 years. I worked with public companies and I am very familiar with the SEC rules for proved oil and gas reserves to be included in public filings. I know the type of support that must exist for the statements made by Extraction and other public companies.

Please consider this to be my offer to assist in the process outlined above and as modified by the Mayor and City Council.

Dear Mayor and City Council Members,

I am a resident of McKay Landing and am very concerned about the number of wells/well pads proposed for the north side of Broomfield. Though my proximity to the well pads is not nearly as close as some, I think environmental damage could be a problem for many outside the traditional setbacks. We can't decide on the direction the wind blows if there is a leak or a fire. It could affect people in all different directions.

Additionally, I recall during the severe flooding several years ago, numerous wells in Weld County leaked but nothing could be done to resolve those issues because resources were pulled in so many directions. If there is a flood or a tornado or a technical problem, I don't feel any reassurance the oil and gas company would protects us and toxins could easily go throughout many residential neighborhoods.

I think fracking on a small scale in residential areas might be reasonable but the scope of these projects is way too big and dangerous. Please do anything in your power to stop these plans from going forward.

My name is Michael Wyn. I am an engineer and a former teacher of Engineering at Long Beach State University, California. My fiancée, Dr. Nancy Stebbins and I have put the down payment for an Anthem Ranch home being built now to be completed in July 2017.

We have learned recently more details and become much concerned about the arrangement of Extraction Oil and Gas company horizontal drilling plan in Broomfield and of the increasingly complex and confusing contractual permits and agreements.

Our understanding was that Extraction Oil and Gas initially applied for and received the Memorandum of Understanding to drill only 24 wells on four pads, Lowell, Sheridan, United and Huron. Now they plan to drill more than six times the original number of horizontal wells in this densely-populated residential area and near water reservoir, and schools. We are alarmed by the much larger number of trucks driving in and out the drilling sites, the increase risks of industrial and traffic accidents and the decrease of property value and guality of life to Broomfield residents.

From my professional experience, the quantitative increase of components will translate qualitatively into non-linear increase in complexity, connectivity and risk of system failure to perform as designed. The six or more folds increase of drill sites will require a more complex pipeline subsystem to route the extracted fossil fuels to receiving stations. This in turn will require much more responsive, complicated organizational and physical safeguard against accidental or otherwise incidents. The meager insurance polity Extraction Oil and Gas carries is plainly inadequate for the scope and plan of activities.

In business, a contract shall be voided if there was omission, intentionally or not or the bidding package had misleading or erroneous data. I believe that Extraction Oil and Gas did not disclose fully their intention when they applied for the horizontal drilling MoU or permit in Broomfield. On this ground the agreement for them to drill can be vacated. A company which misleads when bidding for contract or to receive MoU/permission to carry our activities with great impact to the general public should and must be removed from any future contract.

In Extraction's "Front Range News", a newsletter "Powered by Extraction Oil & Gas" a Sep 21 2016 article [1] has the headline:

Study Refutes Claims of Lower Home Values Due to Hydraulic Fracturing, Oil and Gas Operations

The article cherrypicks certain sentences from a recent CSU report [2] to justify the headline, but misses some important contrary findings in the report that are particularly important in our current massive scale (141 wells) situation in Broomfield.

My takeway of the report is that I, and every homeowner in Anthem, can expect \$1000s to \$10000s of our home equity to be redistributed to Extraction's investors and executives.

The article is worth reading -- skip the complicated math which defends the methods to academic mathematicians.

It would be interesting to ask (publicly?) an Extraction official if they stand behind this report and then point out the following quotes from the report:

"In urban areas or incorporated townships the number of wells being drilled at the time of the house sale did have a statistically significant negative effect on house prices, although again the effect was quite small at less than a 1% decrease in house price FOR EACH WELL being drilled within a half mile of a house at the time of sale." [emphasis added]

"As can be seen, drilling activity within a half mile of the house during the time a buyer is deciding on a house results in a measurable negative effect on house prices in urban areas but no effect in rural areas. However, the effect in the urban area is still quite small at -1% of the house price FOR EACH WELL being drilled at the time of house sale. While a producing well near a house in an urban area has a significant but small positive effect on house prices in the semi-log model, the effect on house price is... about one-tenth of one percent PER producing well within a half mile." [3]

- "...in urban areas, increasing distance from drilling activity slightly, but statistically significantly, reduces house prices."

Mayor Ahrens and council members --

I unfortunately will be unable to attend the January 10 council meeting but wanted to make a suggestion related to the proposed short-term fracking moratorium.

In a discussion among Broomfield neighbors on Nextdoor.com, there is some disagreement as to whether the safety concerns and suggested risks (air, water, earth movement, disaster, traffic, etc.) are being overstated. I.e. "nothing bad could possibly ever happen" from one side vs. "the world will end" from the other.

It occurred to me that it may be possible to get an independent evaluation of the risks, measured economically, in terms that a business -- and perhaps the state courts -- could understand.

I don't know how easy this is or even if it is possible, but suppose Broomfield were to commission a very large international professional insurance and risk analysis firm, such as Lloyd's of London, to quote an insurance premium (one-time and/or annual) to financially protect both the city and, individually, all Broomfield residents from potential negative effects of Extraction's proposed project.

If the premium quote is sufficiently small, it would serve to reassure residents and add perspective to the safety risks, and CCOB and/or any individual resident could choose to purchase a policy to protect themselves. If the premium would be very large, Extraction could be asked to pay the premium (or purchase a bond paying annual premiums in perpetuity) as a cost-of-doing-business and, if they refused, a lawsuit could challenge that a for-profit business is placing a measurable undue economic impact on residents and CCOB.

I understand that Extraction does have "an insurance policy", but I suspect that is to protect them, not to protect us. Specifically, I suspect the "covered risks" is very different than CCOB or residents would require because, after all, bankruptcy laws ultimately protect a public corporation from worst case loss but do nothing to protect CCOB or individual residents from worst case safety impacts.

I hope this suggestion is helpful. Thanks for your time and interest in understanding this very complex issue!

Hello again,

I wrote an email yesterday (12/22/2016) to the city council that had a tone that was much more forceful and accusatory than I had intended. There was some misinformation, some anger, and a lot of frustration, and I totally lashed out. I used you all as punching bags, and that's not OK, and it's certainly not constructive. Parts of the email are inappropriate, and I'm extremely sorry. Please accept my apology for implying that you are not committed to your job or the people of Broomfield. I made a mistake. Mea Culpa.

If I'm being honest, I didn't expect any of you to read my email (again, my misinformation, nothing to do with you). I certainly didn't expect the responses I got. I expected the process to look something like this: I write an email where I vent and release my frustrations, and I feel better (which I didn't, by the way). Some admin somewhere reads it and auto-responds with a form letter. My email is filed somewhere, end of conversation, I assumed that you all were receiving many emails like this a day, maybe even hundreds. I figured I was a voice in a crowd of other voices, a drop in the bucket, so to speak. The fact that several of you read AND responded to the email has already renewed my faith in the system. What makes me even more inspired is the responses I did receive. Despite the fact that I was being rude and accusatory, at least one of you reached out to me and attempted to build a bridge where I was seemingly building a wall (Thank you, Kevin). Every response called me out on my inappropriate accusations and misinformation, which I really appreciated. It's become clear to me that the fracking ban is a very sensitive subject for many of you, an effort that some of you have put countless hours into on behalf of the residents of Broomfield. I didn't realize that the sensitivity level on this topic was so high, or quite frankly, that anyone would really care what I had to say about it. Again, I was wrong. Again, I'm sorry.

Would you allow me to try again? I know a lot of residents who are scared, frustrated, and feel helpless about the cluster fracking proposal. The media is portraying it as a bait and switch (http://kdvr.com/2016/11/18/broomfield-residents-upsetabout-plan-for-over-100-oil-wells-near-neighborhood/). It's very difficult to piece together information about what's happening and what any of it means to us. There is a lot of misinformation out there, and it's damaging. We see the city council as the first line of defense to protect us from what a lot of us see as a possible threat to the things we hold dear: clean air, water, lovely views, rising property values, our children's safety, among others. We read ordinances that purport the council and the city/county have some kind of authority over permitting and land use (Ordinance 1986, for example). Despite the fact that state law trumps city law and we cannot impose an all-out fracking ban in Broomfield, we see the municipal level as a place where we can at least start to fight the fight, which is exactly what some of you are doing. I ask you to vote yes on Ordinance 2038 on January 10th. I thank you for voting yes on December 6th.

What I also think would be useful is a better central resource for residents to access and get educated about exactly what we are facing. I work in training and education, and I can testify to the benefits of clear, effective learning materials that distill information. There's a lot of "piecing together" and splicing of information that a common Broomfield resident has to do at this point to figure out what the heck is even going on, and even with Ph.D., I'm having a hard time navigating the various ordinances, lawsuits, protective acts, etc. etc. in a way that leads me to a place of understanding. Please know this: many of us are just finding out about this right now. We are starting at square one. While I take responsibility for my own misinformation, it's not entirely for lack of trying. Should it take a common resident 40-50 hours of reading and research to come to a foundational sense of "getting" what's going on? It's a place to start, but's not ideal. I'd argue that a better educational resources that works to give executive summaries, infographics, and maybe even draws a visual picture of the current processes, ordinances, laws, potential outcomes would be really helpful for people seeking information. I manage projects like this for a living-- it wouldn't be hard to put something like this together in a few weeks. I also understand that this effort may (and probably should) be a phase 2 initiative, so please don't take this suggestion to mean that I don't think you haven't thought of this. In fact, I'm sure you already have. If you think I can help with this initiative or would like to talk more about it, please don't hesitate to let me know.

I'm going to shut up now. Again, I'm sorry for my previous email. The frustration and passion are real, the accusations and call-outs are not. Also, please don't feel obligated to respond unless you want to. Thank you for showing me that I do have a voice, and that my voice should be used to build bridges, not walls.

Hello.

My family and I have have been Broomfield residents for exactly 10 years. We chose Broomfield because of the great schools, proximity to Boulder and Denver, and because of the dedication of the city/county to preserve open space and provide recreation space for families and active people. I'm an avid runner, and I've loved taking advantage of the open spaces and trails created by thoughtful planning. We honestly love Broomfield, and recently when faced with the opportunity to build a dream house outside of Broomfield, we decided to compromise for something less ideal but to stay in Broomfield because we love the community. We are dedicated to this community and its success. We have three children, ages 12, 7, and 4. Two of them were born here in Broomfield and have lived here all their lives. My husband owns a local software company and I work for Oracle here in Broomfield.

We own two houses in Broomfield and just signed papers to build a third in Anthem Highlands that will be over \$1 million by the time it's completed. We've enjoyed watching our home values increase over the past 5-10 years.

But now we are dealing with the fracking bait-and-switch that you, our city council, has allowed to happen. We are very disappointed. As my husband and I embark on building a new home within 2500 feel of at least one of the three wells. we are heartbroken to see the lack of commitment that the council seems to have towards new and future residents of Anthem Highlands. To allow an unprecedented amount of wells to be built within 2500 feet of a community development that you approved, schools, homes, and drinking water reservoirs is, quite frankly, completely disappointing and ignorant. I'm writing to you to express our hope that City Council will keep the second reading of the proposed fracking moratorium on the Council's January agenda. None of the Wildgrass neighbors with whom I've spoken support Extraction's request to postpone the second reading for another month.

We were thrilled with Council's action on the first reading. More than 70% of Wildgrass residents oppose the industrial nightmare Extraction is attempting to impose on our community. I would like the Broomfield City Council to send Governor Hickenlooper the above letter.

I attended the Broomfield City Council meeting on December 6.

Much of the discussion was on ways to fill Elizabeth Law-Evans "empty toolbox" to postpone or slow drilling and fracking.

I don't have the numbers to support the above statement.

I don't think the numbers need to be part of the above letter but Broomfield needs to be able to justify the statement when asked.

We can't predict the future but we can tie the numbers to the 2008 recession.

From mid 2014 to mid 2016 our housing market re-gained 17 percent in value to return to the pre-recession value.

Mid 2008 \$223,000; Mid 2014 \$190,000; Mid 2016 \$222,000

While mid 2016 gas prices at Henry Hub are 3/4 of the mid 2014 prices and 1/3 of the mid 2008 prices.

And mid 2016 oil prices at Cushing, OK are 7/8 of the mid 2014 prices and just over 1/3 of the mid 2008 prices.

We don't want to reverse the housing value gains that we lost in 2008 and have just now recovered.

There are 6 houses built and 25 ? houses now waiting construction (on hold?) within 1000 feet of the Sheridan well pad.

The area homes were listed around \$500,000 ? in early 2016.

I don't want to privatize the profits of the gas and oil company while socializing the cost of their development.

I am hoping you can put real numbers and trends to the housing prices and potential lost revenue.

What our local government can do is ensure setback laws are followed. We can request verification that the Form 2A application made by Extraction is in compliance with setback laws.

http://www.law.du.edu/documents/student-law-office-clinical-programs/ELC-Form-2a-Executive-Summarv.pdf In July of 2012, the COGCC sued the City of Longmont over its regulations that prohibited placement of oil and gas facilities in residential areas. Longmont believed that its regulations were a necessary addition to the state regulations which allowed wells and production equipment as close as 150 feet from homes. In February of 2013, the COGCC updated its regulations to require a greater distance between oil and gas facilities and "building units," which includes homes and occupied commercial spaces. The regulations changed the minimum setback requirement from 150 feet to 500 feet with numerous exceptions for rural areas, for expanding existing wellhead locations, and for locations with existing surface use agreements. The Form 2A application is used to ensure the setback regulations are being followed. The Form 2A requires oil and gas operators to provide the number of wells on a single site and the distances from building units and high-occupancy buildings such as schools and hospitals. The 2013 rule changes also required operators to notify homeowners within 1,000 feet of the proposed location about the application and also gave local governments additional time to comment on applications - particularly those within the residential "urban mitigation zones." Finally, the rules require that "multi-well production facilities" proposed within the "buffer zone" (1,000 feet of a building unit) be "as far as possible" from building units. Requiring multi-well production facilities to be located as far as possible from homes was recognition that multiple wells and related production equipment have far greater impacts on neighboring land uses than a single well. In the past ten years, technological advancements in horizontal drilling have allowed oil and gas operators to routinely access oil and gas resources from as far as two miles away. Horizontal drilling provides operators much greater flexibility for the siting and location of well heads and production facilities.

Has the City and County of Broomfield requested a review of Form 2A?

While the lines from the hearing dates point toward the grayed portions of the 3 northernmost applications depicted on the map (Lowell (North PSU), Sheridan North (West PSU), and Sheridan North (East PSU)), those three applications also include the corresponding colored, non-grayed areas below State Highway 7. (The grayed areas represent property that is not within Broomfield.)

The other eight applications depicted on the map with no hearing date, including the Sheridan (South PSU) application, were approved by the Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission (COGCC) on October 24, 2016. I hope that provides clarification.

Thank you for your inquiry. I gathered additional information from Broomfield's Public Health and Environment Department. Broomfield's drinking water comes from Carter Lake through a pipeline to Glasser Reservoir that does not involve the proposed location. Broomfield tests for VOCs in drinking water; no VOCs have been detected. Our annual report states that "contaminants not reported were not detected."

There are no wastewater injection wells proposed for the Sheridan Pad and there are none in Broomfield. The Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission (COGCC) permits and regulates underground injection control wells. More information can be found on COGCC's website (COGCC). If you have not already, I would encourage you to look at the information available on Broomfield's webpage. (Broomfield's Oil & Gas Development webpage) I hope this information answers your questions.

I am considering moving to the Anthem community with my family, but I have some concerns about fracking that will be occurring on the Sheridan Pad. This pad will be just a few feet from the nearest house in the Lookout Village development. I have a few major concerns that perhaps you can help me address:

- Water Quality: I see that Broomfield has had high water quality and does testing at regular intervals, however, I did not see testing for VOCs in the list. What is Broomfield doing to ensure ongoing safety of its water supply, especially given that the Sheridan Pad lies adjacent to a culvert/stream(?) that leads straight to the reservoir.
- Earthquakes: Is injection of wastewater allowed in Broomfield? In the event that fracking causes seismic activity that results in damage to a home, what is the process for seeking remediation from the extraction company? Is the city of

Broomfield or another neutral third party involved at all with assigning likelihood of causality that would likely be needed during litigation?

Dear Representatives,

I bought my home in Broomfield in 1996. I am an original home owner in the Brandywine subdivision. I'm very disturbed with the plans for fracking in the City and County of Broomfield. I've worked too long and put too much into my home to have it's value or perceived value diminished by fracking and pollution. I've been reading economic journals regarding the impact of fracking on home values. I've learned that property value is attached to things like perception of safe reliable drinking water. I was shocked to learn that Broomfield plans to allow fracking right next to our drinking water reservoir. Regardless of any environmental impact study, allowing fracking operations next to drinking water reservoirs will certainly diminish property value for all of Broomfield because of perception alone. In addition to this, fears of air pollution, noise pollution and earthtquakes also stand to lower property values in Broomfield. The wells and platforms are a horrible eye sore. This will make it hard for us to keep Broomfield the wonderful play and recreation oriented place it has been for families. How will our tax base be impacted if property values are lowered? How will we pay for great schools? And honestly, who wants to jog past an oil well? Not me.

My concerns are based on economic research done and repeated by many economists. Here is an example article from the American Economic Review.

Access to a safe, reliable source of drinking water is an important determinant of a property's value; even a perceived threat to that access can have detrimental effects on housing prices. This is very important, as the potential for shale gas development to contaminate groundwater has been hotly debated

and

The burden of aesthetic disruptions is corroborated by the finding that the positive impacts are only driven by wells that are not in view of the property.

and the study finds

a statistically significant drop of 13.9 percent (p-value of 0.051) for groundwater-dependent homes and finally even for folks who have access to piped water that won't be contaminated

The positive effects from lease payments appear to be offset largely by visual disamenities, as the coefficient on wells in view is statistically insignificant.

What does the study say? It says that ground water contamination risks (even if only perceived) are great enough to reduce property values in a statistically significant way. Additionally it concludes that the positive effects of lease payments from fracking are offset by "visual disamenities". That means the eye sore of a well in an otherwise beautiful community lowers the values of the homes in a statistically significant way that is more meaningful than any short term gains in leasing payments.

Let's take Windsor Colorado (where fracking is in full bloom) and compare it's growth in home values next to Broomfield. The median home value in Windsor is \$349,400. Windsor home values have gone up 5.3% over the past year and Zillow predicts they will rise 3.7% within the next year. The median list price per square foot in Windsor is \$149, which is lower than the Fort Collins Metro average of \$188. The median price of homes currently listed in Windsor is \$363,950. The median home value in Broomfield is \$389,900. Broomfield home values have gone up 12.6% over the past year and Zillow predicts they will rise 4.2% within the next year. The median list price per square foot in Broomfield is \$225, which is lower than the Denver Metro average of \$227. The median price of homes currently listed in Broomfield is \$461,425. The median rent price in Broomfield is \$1,895, which is higher than the Denver Metro median of \$1,850.

What do you notice about the growth? Broomfield is experiencing double digit growth whereas Windsor is growing at not even half the pace. The study I mentioned above does site a Weld County (Windsor) reference. These are just the facts. Studies show fracking lowers property values and/or growth of property values. And honestly, who wants to live next to an oil well anyway? Not me.

We need not rely only on the thoughts of economic scholars publishing articles in journals. We can turn directly to our local news to see how fracking has negatively impacted neighboring communities.

Fort Collins, CO

In February 2013, fracking fluid gushed from an oil well near Fort Collins for almost 30 hours before it was stopped. A piece of equipment fell onto a valve and broke it, causing the oil-laden fluid to rush out. Observers said the liquid was tinted green.

Windsor, CO

In February 2013, fracking fluid with oil in it gushed from an oil well at a PDC Energy site in Windsor, Colorado for over thirty hours after a piece of equipment broke a hydraulic valve. The spill was one of multiple PDC Energy spills on record that year.

Greeley, CO

In March 2014, two workers were injured in an explosion and fire at an oil and gas drilling site north of the town of Greeley. The explosion occurred as workers were pulling an oil and water mixture out of storage tanks to take to a separator. Firefighters believe that static electricity could have set off the vapors. According to onlookers, the explosion shook houses and set a fire that could be seen for miles.

Halliburton halted all fracking activity at the site until a review of the accident was completed.

When a Noble Energy crew was working on an oil and gas tank at an organic farm near Ault, Colorado, a worker failed to open a valve correctly, resulting in a processing equipment backup that caused crude oil to spray across more than 150,000 square feet of an organic farm. The resulting 240 cubic yards of contaminated soil had to be physically scraped from the crop land. It is unsure whether the ground will be fit to grow crops again.

A. Has Extraction Oil & Gas who are proposing a major industrial complex adjacent to a housing development with (need number) of homes and (need number) residents been required to pay for an impact study? Experts performing this study should be independently hired by the City & County of Broomfield.

If not who will nay for the training and We moved to Anthem to be in a safe, family-friendly community to raise our 17-month old son. If we had known there was a potential fracking project being proposed right down the street, we would have never moved here.

Hello Mayor and Council Members,

I wanted to attend the council meeting on December 6th to speak out against these proposed fracking sites, but unfortunately I have a previously scheduled work trip in place. So I decided to write instead.

As a mother and homeowner in Anthem Highlands, I am writing to voice my concern and objections to these proposed projects. The size and scope of these fracking sites will devastate this beautiful area. It puts a community at risk of exposure to contaminants that may cause short and long term health issues. It could be devastating to our property values. You all have done a wonderful job attracting new business to our area. A project like this could impede further economic growth. This affects ALL OF US.

When I first heard about fracking coming to our area, I was concerned. I attended the meeting hosted by Extraction Oil and Gas, and left with mixed feelings. The plan they spoke of was much smaller in scale. Only a few wells, they would be in and out in 6 months. I tried to look at it objectively, balancing the needs of energy growth with having this happen so close to where I chose to build a life. I was not totally on board with this plan, but I tried to have an open mind, after all fracking has been in this area for quite some time. And then everything changed. The proposed site changed from a few wells to industrial sized fracking pads. When all is said and done, we will have close to 80 wells within a mile of our homes, our playgrounds, our schools. Two years of round the clock drilling and exposure to air pollutants. A lifetime of risks of oil spills, water contamination, explosions. It is mind boggling how this is even possible. A fracking site this large so close to a neighborhood is unprecedented. Please do not let us be the test community for such a large site!

Like many people in this neighborhood, we have two small children. Emily just turned 4 and Charlie is a 18 months old. They love to play outside, especially in the parks in our neighborhood. They will both be attending the new elementary school in Anthem once it is built. I am scared this project could make my children sick, make me sick. There are no studies in place about the impact of a project this size on our health. There is no way to say with 100% conviction that our health will be protected. No one can promise me that an explosion won't happen while my kids play in the park 1000 ft from the drilling site. You can't promise me that an methane leak, or an oil leak won't happen. That our water won't be contaminated. You can't promise that we will be safe. No one can, because a fracking site this large so close to a neighborhood is unprecedented. Please do not let us be the test community for such a large site!

On top of these health and safety concerns, I am concerned about our investment in our home. Our life savings went into buying this home. We have saved and worked so hard to move to Broomfield to provide our children with a good schools, a safe community. We didn't just build a home in Anthem, we built the start of our life. Having TWO industrial sized fracking pads with in a mile of our home could negatively affect housing prices. You can't promise that we will be able to sell our home once these plans are common knowledge. You can't promise that we won't go upside down in our investment. Dear mayor and Council Members.

I am horrified to learn that our communities are about to be brutally assaulted by Extraction Oil & Gas which proposes an oversized, in fact ENORMOUS, industrial operation which will last for 25 years, and which threatens to disrupt our lives in the Anthem communities. In my research I have yet to find reference to any sites that have more than 20 drill wells on a pad, yet here in Anthem the proposals are for 40 per pad.

My research has also revealed that ONE fracked well would require an average, in total (water, chemicals, wastewater, other materials, removal) of 1122 tanker truckloads into the well site.

If the drilling were spaced out evenly over 25 years that would mean that there would be 7,140 truck trips per year, 137 truck trips per week, and 19.6 truck trips per day into our area. However, if the spacing is not even, and is more intense in some years than others, those numbers go way up.

I have also discovered that the 500 foot setback regulation may be easily negated in the case of an "active well." Such a well can be expanded to include multiple different drilling sites within the same well-pad. Thus, DRILL SITES THAT DON'T YET EXIST ARE GRANDFATHERED IN SO AS TO NULLIFY THE SETBACK REGULATION.

Simply on the basis of the facts above, and not even taking into account air and water quality, or quality of life in this community (where taxes are so high) we see ourselves at great risk.

How can we allow ourselves to be the victims of such a large scale operation, with no recourse for ourselves, our health, our environment and our property values????



Dear Mayor,

We've had a few discussions regarding my concerns about the upcoming plans to develop a large-scale fracking facility around the grounds here in Anthem Highlands and surrounding neighborhoods of Broomfield, Colorado. I remain convinced that this needs to be explored scientifically—and by the numbers--before work is started on this project for the safety and well-being of the residents of both Anthem and Broomfield more broadly.

Originally (May 2016 Council meeting) this site plan was described as having 22-24 wells. In more recent plans described by Extraction Oil and Gas (October 2016), the target is now for 140 wells. When pressed for details during the October meeting, representatives of Extraction were unable to identify a similar site anywhere in the USA, which parallels this in magnitude and scale, let alone in proximity to a large population of residential homes.

For these reasons the scale of this project needs to be evaluated for its impact to our communities.

1. Potential water contamination needs to be studied. Extraction could provide no comparative data around the likelihood of ground water contamination for this ultra large-scale project. In the planned location, ground water contamination will, in very high likelihood, cause contamination of the ponds surrounding Anthem, as well as the planned Broomfield reservoir. It is in our best interests to request a scientific study given the revised magnitude of the proposed project.

Example 1: Extraction was unable to offer a number for level of containment of both fracking fluid and well by-product. We calculate that for 140 wells, 420 million gallons of water/fracking fluid mix will be forced into the grounds around these wells and into our neighborhoods. We know from basic engineering principles that some small amount of material will leak out. The number is NOT zero; it never is. Even if 10 parts per million (a relatively small trace—0.001%) of material leaks out, we end up with 4,000 gallons of undesirable material finding its way into the local ponds and reservoirs. This will pose an unquestionable risk to residents and wildlife residing there. A typical pond in this area is roughly 40,000 gallons. This contamination would represent 10% pollution of these ponds, which would with utmost certainty kill all wildlife in these ponds.

If someone were to go to every Home Depot in the Denver area and buy every gallon of xylene, anti-freeze, paint thinner, acetone and lacquer thinner from their shelves and pour them into our ponds, it would do orders of magnitude less damage than this level of leakage from these wells. Again, this is based on trace levels of leakage.

All of the ponds surrounding Anthem are interconnected. If one is contaminated, they will all eventually be. No amount of remediation will be rapid enough to reverse the damage.

Further, this water is used to irrigate the common grounds around Anthem. This is where children play and folks enjoy outdoor activities. This would be a disaster.

Example 2: Extraction provided data that they could contain VOC escapes to 98%. This leaves 2% finding its way into our communities? A typical methane/natural gas well produces 2 million cubic feet of product per day. At 98% containment, this leaves an escape level of 40,000 cubic feet per well, and for 140 wells this is 5.6 million cubic feet per day escape in a relatively contained area. That's enough to fill 10 football fields per day to a height of 10ft. We would certainly want to know if these numbers are accurate, and if not, what escapes we should expect from these wells. Methane is odorless, colorless and life threatening to breathe. It is highly flammable. It hovers near to the ground. These characteristics are well documented as having combined in the past with devastating impacts to people.

If these numbers are accurate, these escapes also pose hazards to those using E-470 and Northwest Parkway—and perhaps I-25.

With respect to the above, it was perhaps tangible to understand how 22-24 wells might be managed, albeit a challenge. But now that this project has been expanded to 140 wells, the need for scientific data has expanded. It may be possible that given the close proximity of these wells, this project cannot be constructed with any safety margin.

It would be reasonable given the expanded scope of this project for Extraction to produce data as assurance to residents, local, and state governments that their intentions are well analyzed and the consequences well understood. If they are truly interested in being a good neighbor, they need to follow through on these requests.

None of the above includes the likelihood of an accident, and Extraction is certainly not exempt from this likelihood as their track record shows. One study shows that at least 1 out of every 200 wells suffers a very significant spill or similar accident. If 140 wells are constructed in close proximity, our chances of some kind of significant, measurable accident affecting this community is 140/200 or 70% likelihood of an accident occurring on this project.

Hello Mayor and Council Members,

I wanted to attend the council meeting on December 6th to speak out against these proposed fracking sites, but unfortunately I have a previously scheduled work trip in place. So I decided to write instead.

As a mother and homeowner in Anthem Highlands, I am writing to voice my concern and objections to these proposed projects. The size and scope of these fracking sites will devastate this beautiful area. It puts a community at risk of exposure to contaminants that may cause short and long term health issues. It could be devastating to our property values. You all have done a wonderful job attracting new business to our area. A project like this could impede further economic growth. This affects ALL OF US.

When I first heard about fracking coming to our area, I was concerned. I attended the meeting hosted by Extraction Oil and Gas, and left with mixed feelings. The plan they spoke of was much smaller in scale. Only a few wells, they would be in and out in 6 months. I tried to look at it objectively, balancing the needs of energy growth with having this happen so close to where I chose to build a life. I was not totally on board with this plan, but I tried to have an open mind, after all fracking has been in this area for quite some time. And then everything changed. The proposed site changed from a few wells to industrial sized fracking pads. When all is said and done, we will have close to 80 wells within a mile of our homes, our playgrounds, our schools. Two years of round the clock drilling and exposure to air pollutants. A lifetime of risks of oil spills, water contamination, explosions. It is mind boggling how this is even possible. A fracking site this large so close to a neighborhood is unprecedented. Please do not let us be the test community for such a large site!

Like many people in this neighborhood, we have two small children. Emily just turned 4 and Charlie is a 18 months old. They love to play outside, especially in the parks in our neighborhood. They will both be attending the new elementary school in Anthem once it is built. I am scared this project could make my children sick, make me sick. There are no studies in place about the impact of a project this size on our health. There is no way to say with 100% conviction that our health will be protected. No one can promise me that an explosion won't happen while my kids play in the park 1000 ft from the drilling site. You can't promise me that an methane leak, or an oil leak won't happen. That our water won't be contaminated. You can't promise that we will be safe. No one can, because a fracking site this large so close to a neighborhood is unprecedented. Please do not let us be the test community for such a large site!

On top of these health and safety concerns, I am concerned about our investment in our home. Our life savings went into buying this home. We have saved and worked so hard to move to Broomfield to provide our children with a good schools, a safe community. We didn't just build a home in Anthem, we built the start of our life. Having TWO industrial sized fracking pads with in a mile of our home could negatively affect housing prices. You can't promise that we will be able to

sell our home once these plans are common knowledge. You can't promise that we won't go upside down in our investment. No one can, because a fracking site this large so close to a neighborhood is unprecedented. Please do not let us be the test community for such a large site!

Thank you for your time in reading this. I will be attending future council meetings. I will stay involved, I will continue to speak out against this project. I will do this not only for the well being of my family, but also for the well being our our community, for Broomfield. I want to protect our legacy and keep Broomfield's designation as one best places to live in Colorado. I don't want Broomfield to be known as the town that was an amazing place to live...until oil and gas devastated it. Please help me in protecting our legacy, our community, for future generations.

Stop Fracking in Broomfield

As former residents of Greeley, we moved to Broomfield to escape the damage of fracking to our land and our city. Fracking companies came to Greeley. They were given police escorts all over town and we were threatened with arrest if we didn't allow fracking companies onto our land. Oil & Gas has a history of bribing city officials, behaving in ways that are completely contrary to the "agreements" they have made with the city/county. No consequences. On top of police and city official corruption, we began experiencing earthquakes. Yes, earthquakes. It isn't surprising if you realize what fracking actually does to the land. (Try taking hose and let water run at the bottom of an ant hill and see what happens to that ant hill.) As soon as residents started to see land damage and worked together to try to sue, the fracking companies declare bankruptcy and leave the land and residents trashed. They simply form new fracking companies and move on down the road to another city/county. They've been doing this all over Wyoming, Colorado, the Dakotas, etc.

Sadly, Broomfield is now allowing the same behavior from Extraction Oil & Gas here in Wildgrass, Anthem Ranch and Anthem Highlands. You have been ELECTED to serve and protect the interests of the people and lands of Broomfield. It is your responsibility to take action against Extraction when they have violated agreements.

What did Extraction do in East Greeley? In the Triple Creek neighborhood there, Extraction's initial promises of a pipeline have been withdrawn. Extraction now claims that the price of oil is currently too low to fund the pipeline project there. Last Friday the Triple Creek neighborhood filed a lawsuit against the COGCC (Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission) for not following their own rules (e.g., newly amended "best practices" that are now called for when oil and gas companies want to establish operations near residential neighborhoods). Who runs the COGCC? Perhaps it should be no surprise: People trained by the oil and gas industry.

How is the Triple Creek situation similar to where we live here in north Broomfield? For starters, our neighborhoods are the second residential-area drilling project application filed by Extraction since the COGCC amended it's drilling guidelines in early 2016 regarding residential fracking. And, just like with Greeley, they are not adhering to best practices.

What are these "best practices?" Among these are "alternative location studies" that are to be conducted as well as the use of pipelines. Like with Triple Creek, Extraction initially said at the first Anthem Highlands meeting that they were in the process of getting leases to build a pipeline. At the second Highlands meeting in late October, NO pipeline had been approved and we were told flagman would handle the truck traffic. Now, if that maybe isn't so much a bait-and-switch, consider Extraction's presentation to our neighborhoods and their PowerPoint. This document reports proposed well numbers inline with what they initially told the mayor and the city council. The PowerPoint indicates 8-12 wells per pad.

The most recent proposals call for 40 wells per pad at each of three pad locations: 1) Lowell (NW corner of Sheridan and Lowell); 2) Sheridan (160th Ave precisely 866 feet east of the closest Highlands residence in Lookout Village); and, 3) the Huron pad (on 160th in-between Sheridan and Huron). And, then, 4) another 20 wells at the United Pad (on 160th opposite Costco). With no pipeline, the amount of trucks will be INSANE; and, don't forget, drilling would take place off-and-on for 25+ years or as long as the shale formation is producing minerals.

What will be the immediate conduit for all of this truck traffic? 160th Avenue from Lowell eastward (and let's not forget the short stretch of Lowell that will be backed up (yes, this includes the bridge over the Northwest Parkway). How many trucks exactly? Consider that the Triple Creek neighborhood is facing 22 wells while the Lowell and Sheridan pads, alone, would have a total of 80 wells plus the required separator tanks. With no pipeline, that's 160+ total tanks straddling the Anthem Highlands area of Lookout Village (just north of 160th and just south of Prebble Creek Parkway).

Again, you have been elected to serve the people of Broomfield, not Extraction. If you do not act in the best interests of the people of Broomfield, we can only assume you have been bought and paid for by Extraction.

We will await your prompt actions on this issue.

Gentlepersons:

Because I have a modest background in the oil industry I was asked by Barbara Farhar, a resident homeowner in Anthem Ranch, to comment on the proposal submitted by Extraction Oil & Gas LLC regarding the Plan of Development for the Broomfield Project (the Plan). I was asked because I was employed in the oil and gas industry for more than 2 decades, representing two small independent producers, and subsequently, until my retirement in 2010, I occasionally represented private land owners and others in oil and gas matters.

The Plan proposes shutting in and plugging several wells and consolidating production onto 4 new well pads, including a pad at the southwest corner of Lowell Blvd. and the Northwest Parkway (the "Lowell Pad"). From the information provided by Extraction, the Lowell Pad will ultimately contain 40 vertical wells. From each of these 40 wells they will drill and frac one or more horizontal laterals.

The Lowell Pad seems to be about 10 acres in size, or about 660 ft. on a side. To fit 40 wells on 10 acres the wells would need to be no more than 95 feet apart. However that leaves no space for derricks, tanks, equipment, trucks, etc.. In fact the wells would be much closer together - -perhaps 30 ft. or less. I do not believe any company in Colorado has drilled that many wells that close together. Extraction acknowledges that the largest pad of which they have knowledge is 11 wells. The risk that a tragic accident could occur, especially during continued drilling after production casing has been set and equipment installed for dozens of prior wells, seems significant and highly probable. Even the best available technology is unlikely to prevent a loss.

Should such an accident occur it is well to keep in mind that the Lowell Pad is less than 1000 ft from a planned Broomfield water reservoir. Even if the water level is higher in elevation than the pad there will still be unavoidable subsurface leakage from drilling fluids and normal spills.

Also, the Lowell pad is about 1200 ft from the picnic and playground area diagonally across the Parkway. That playground is dramatically lower than the Lowell Pad adding to the danger. And the Lowell Pad is less than 1000 ft. from the homesites in Anthem Filing #2.

The source of the necessary water for drilling and fracking 40 wells is unclear as is the means of bringing it to the site. Broomfield's water is far too valuable. Use of a canal or pipeline to bring water from a remote source has been suggested but that seems highly unlikely. Tank trucks will most likely be needed.

Likewise the disposal of the waste water from drilling and fracking is not clear. Again, movement by canal or pipeline seems unlikely and tank trucks will be needed. The recent earthquakes near Greeley (and in Oklahoma) should make it obvious that no disposal wells for fracking fluids should be drilled in this area. Will other counties continue to accept waste water and fracking fluids from Broomfield's wells?

The route of the numerous trucks and tankers to (and from) the Lowell pad has not been discussed. The effect upon the condition and future maintenance of Broomfield's roads could be severe.

Finally, Extraction claims that, based on a study from Weld County, one well will affect home values by less than one percent. Using only the Lowell Pad of 40 wells this suggests that there may be a 40% decline in the value of the homes in Anthem and other adjacent areas! Even assuming the estimate is wrong by a large factor, does Broomfield City/County want this development to lose 25% or more in its assessed and taxable value?

Forced pooling has been mentioned, but it is a non-issue having been decided by the courts long ago. Hydraulic fracturing has also been decided. In this discussion they are merely distractions.

Of far greater significance is the cumulative impact of this proposal upon the adjacent properties and upon the greater Broomfield community. Reworking of the existing wells may be a safer alternative.

These comments are based upon the information which Extraction provided at the public meetings on October 25 and 26 and Extraction's "Plan of Development for the Broomfield Project."

Our grave concerns relate to the Sheridan and Lowell pads planned development by Extraction Oil & Gas in Broomfield, CO.

There has not been sufficient research to definitively conclude that fracking is entirely safe especially given the planned scope.

The proximity of these large scale fracking sites to residential neighborhoods is unprecedented and irresponsible. Just because they can, doesn't mean they should.

Furthermore, forced pooling by oil and gas should not be allowed when oil and gas have less than 50 percent of the mineral rights, as is the case in Broomfield.

Why are we allowing them to drill not only under our homes, but under a pre-k-8 school, playgrounds and adjacent a water reservoir?



Hello!

From information I received from COGCC, I understand that you are the Local Government Designee ("LGD") for the COGCC. I hope that is correct.

First, let me start out by saying that I am pro-fracking and pro-domestic sources of energy. However, I also believe we have an obligation to the land and people that make up the United States, and specifically Colorado, to take advantage of domestic drilling opportunities in a reasonable and responsible manner.

Second, I am not an expert in fracking, but I have done enough research on my own to understand the pros and cons. And given all of that, again, I am still pro-fracking.

Finally, before I became aware of this issue, I never contacted anyone in local, state or federal government or regulatory agencies about anything - ever. So this is new for me and I hope you understand that I come to you with the utmost respect for your expertise and the execution of your individual responsibilities within the Broomfield government.

With that said, following are my concerns about the proposed fracking sites in North Broomfield near the Anthem Residential Community:

I am a resident of the Anthem Highlands Residential Community located in North Broomfield. I have recently learned that Extraction Oil & Gas has plans to drill 140 wells on 4 pads near our neighborhood. Two of these pads will be located next to Anthem and within 1000 feet of several homes, and otherwise, in very close proximity to the neighborhood in general, local schools, parks, reservoirs, and planned retail and business developments along Highway 7, Sheridan, Huron, and Lowell. It is my understanding that these pads are unprecedented in size as there are no other 40 well pad sites in Colorado, let alone 4 such pads in a residential area. I have learned that initial studies by the CDPHE show a significant increase in air pollutants during the drilling and completion phases. However, the final results of this study will not be available until 2018 which is too late for us! This study refers to drilling and completion only lasting for a few days to a few weeks. If this plan moves forward, the consecutive drilling and completion of these wells will take at least 2 years of non-stop drilling and completion activities. I am also concerned about the value of my property decreasing with such extensive industrial activity in my neighborhood, along with concerns about

environmental affects, safety, increased truck traffic, water usage, mineral rights of residents and forced pooling, and more.

It is my sincere hope as a resident of Colorado and the immediately affected area of these 4 proposed fracking sites, that you will do your part in the execution of your individual responsibilities to objectively consider the appropriateness of these proposed sites as it relates to the residents of the surrounding communities.

I am interested in hearing your plans regarding interfacing with the COGCC regarding Broomfield residents' concerns regarding these proposed fracking sites. I look forward to hearing from you.

Last summer I attended the council meeting when Boyd McMaster discussed the four consolidation fracking pads to be developed near Anthem Ranch. He said there are about 30 active wells in Broomfield that would be capped while developing the four consolidation pads.

Last week Mr. McMaster and his team presented at a meeting here at Anthem Ranch. I asked how many wells would be developed on each pad and he replied about 40! I was shocked. The four pads being developed here are not consolidation pads. They are large industrial development pads.

I spoke with another Extraction representative after the meeting and asked her about the amount of trucks that would be on the roads around here. She replied that during peak backflow there would be about 10 trucks per day per well. Can you imagine the traffic on 160th and the surrounding area? I can't.

I have many concerns about fracking. I am concerned about the chemicals used and air and water quality. I know Extraction says they will capture methane gas, but with such a large amount of fracking so close to our home I worry. My husband has a chronic lung condition and air quality is critical to us. Also, it concerns me that they will be drilling under our reservoirs. Water is so precious here.

We purchased our home in Broomfield for a certain level of quality of life. I feel that will be forever changed if this project goes through as Extraction has planned.

There are many unanswered questions about fracking. Please help us delay this project until further study can be done. And help us curtail the size of this project. Approximately 80 wells on the Sheridan and Lowell pads within a mile of my home is extremely disconcerting.

Our grave concerns relate to the Sheridan and Lowell pads planned development by Extraction Oil & Gas.

There has not been sufficient research to definitively conclude that fracking is entirely safe especially given the planned scope.

The proximity of these large scale fracking sites to residential neighborhoods is unprecedented and irresponsible. Just because they can, doesn't mean they should.

We just invested in our home here in Anthem Broomfield, a community in which we planned to raise our young children.

I, nor any of the other residents signed on for the years of daily construction traffic, noise and (air, water, noise, light) pollution this project will entail. Nor the potential ground fissures in already precarious soil.

At our neighborhood meeting on 10/25/2016, Boyd McMaster informed us that they were submitting their plans to the city this week and part of their obligation was to hold the meeting in our neighborhood.

At this meeting, Extraction shared the number of wells they now intend to drill:

Lowell Pad: 40 Sheridan Pad: 40 United Pad: 40 Huron Pad: 20 TOTAL: 140 wells

History of Well Numbers:

- Per the Sovereign agreement on 08/27/13, there were 10 pads and 31 wells
- Per Extraction's supplement on 05/31/16, they wanted to reduce the 10 pads to 3 pads ...while all other terms of the MOU remain unchanged (so 31 wells)
- Per our HOA meeting on 10/25/16, there are now 100 wells between the Sheridan, United, and Huron pads plus 40 wells on the Lowell pad.

Extraction was asked where they had a development of similar size near a residential neighborhood so that we could see it first hand. Extraction has never drilled 40 wells on one pad! No other company in Colorado has drilled 40 wells on one pad! They pointed out the Johnson Trust operation in Frederick near Hwy 52 with 11 wells as a large scale operation near a neighborhood.

(Per the COGCC website, the Johnson Trust site is located at NWSW 13 2N68W and has 9 wells).

Not only are they drilling more wells on one pad than has ever been done in Colorado, they are building 4 of these large scale pads. Drilling is limited to 2 rigs based on available power and each well takes about a week (6-8 days) to drill so we are looking at 70 weeks of drilling for each rig to create the 140 wells. They then estimated about 120 days of continuous sand delivery for completion, but they would have "flaggers" out to direct traffic. Then who knows what will happen over the next 25-30 years as the wells run dry. Will Extraction still be around to reclaim it?

This concentration of all the gas operations in the Broomfield area in one location is unfair! We purchased homes with the intention of raising families and enjoying the benefits that come with planned communities, not dealing with years of drilling and completion activities.

The CDPHE's report states that air pollution is greatly elevated during drilling and completion so we can look forward to about 2 years of elevated pollution levels for our young children!

In reviewing the COGCC October Docket, I found that Extraction also has plans for 30 more wells just north of Anthem! They are not done yet!!!

1S68W: 140 Wells (Assuming these are the Sheridan, Lowell, United, and Huron Pads)

1N68W: 30 Wells (Supposedly a pad just north of Hwy 7 at Lowell Blvd)

Now that Extraction (XOG) has gone public, we're going to have access to some independent (meaning nonunderwriter) analysis of its prospects for profitability. Here are some excerpts from one such analysis (quoted material is the opinions of the author, all caps for the "watch your back" excerpts, with my notes in brackets): "XOG's balance sheet does not reflect one significant offbalance sheet liability, a minimum volume commitment for its production. Since the commitment can be satisfied with the delivery of future production volumes instead of cash, it does not impact income statements or the balance sheet unless and until actual cash must be paid for a shortfall. THE MINIMUM VOLUME COMMITMENT HAS A POTENTIAL LIABILITY OF ALMOST \$900 MILLION, A NOT INSIGNIFICANT AMOUNT THAT SHOWS THAT XOG MUST KEEP DRILLING TO DELIVER FUTURE VOLUMES AND AVOID CASH PAYMENTS.""XOG'S DRILLING WILL CERTAINLY GENERATE CASH FLOW, BUT WILL THEY
MAKE MONEY? THE CHART **BELOW SHOWS THEIR** HISTORICAL COSTS, AND THEY DO NOT PRESENT A PARTICULARLY COMPELLING PICTURE. The figures in XOG's Pro Forma Statement of Operations indicate the difficulties XOG has had in its early operations in generating a profit. ALTHOUGH XOG HAS BEEN VERY ACTIVE IN DRILLING NEW WELLS AND GENERATED TOTAL REVENUES OF \$139 MILLION FOR THE SIX MONTH PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, 2016, IT REPORTED A NET LOSS OF \$100 MILLION AFTER TAX." [NOTE: If it is losing money on these prices, what do you think its cash flow will look like when prices drop from here?]"If XOG were a full cost company and had to write the value of its reserves down to SEC10 value, it would have an impairment of roughly \$400 million. Subtracting that amount from shareholders' equity of \$1.14 billion would leave a net book value of equity of \$740 million, or roughly \$5/share on a fully diluted basis. ORDINANCE NO. 2038

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM UNTIL JUNE 13, 2017 ON THE PROCESSING AND APPROVAL OF ANY APPLICATION FOR A PERMIT OR LAND USE APPROVAL RELATED TO THE OPERATION OF A BUSINESS ENGAGING IN OIL AND GAS PRODUCTION AND PROHIBITING THE CONDUCT OF DRILLING FOR OIL AND GAS OR CONDUCTING HYDRAULIC FRACTURING OPERATIONS DURING THE MORATORIUM, SO THAT THE CITY AND COUNTY MAY EVALUATE WHETHER TO ADOPT UPDATED REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS, there is not currently any active drilling for oil and gas in the City and County of Broomfield ("Broomfield"); and

WHEREAS, in the past few years, significant changes in the technology, science and impacts have occurred in the Oil and Gas production industry; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has become aware that certain prospective operators of Oil and Gas drilling and production operations have proposed numerous large scale operations; and

WHEREAS, Oil and Gas drilling and production operations often have significant heavy truck, equipment and other vehicular trips that have the potential to, among other things, seriously impact Broomfield's roads and traffic; and

WHEREAS, more than three years have passed since the City Council last updated its regulations for Oil and Gas in 2013; and

WHEREAS, the City has no current land use or business regulations relating to Oil and Gas traffic impacts or traffic impact fees, although the regulation of traffic and the imposition of traffic impact fees on Oil and Gas operators is a power specifically allowed to local governments; and

WHEREAS, the City and County needs time to assess whether its regulatory requirements need to be updated, to the extent allowed by applicable law; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is also cognizant of the recent decisions of the Colorado Supreme Court in the City of Longmont and City of Fort Collins cases holding that local governments cannot permanently ban, nor prohibit for extended periods of time, drilling for oil and gas or hydraulically fracturing wells, but which also acknowledged the role of local government in certain types of regulation;

WHEREAS, a temporary moratorium until June 13, 2017 is a reasonable length of time for the City to properly investigate the possibility of updating Broomfield's regulatory framework relating to Oil and Gas operations; and

WHEREAS, Oil and Gas operators will not be unduly prejudiced by the imposition of such a temporary moratorium.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED:

- Section 1. Findings and Intent. The foregoing recitals are incorporated herein by reference and adopted as findings and determinations of the City Council.
- <u>Section 2</u>. <u>Temporary Moratorium</u>. Upon the adoption of this Ordinance, a moratorium is imposed upon the conduct of drilling for oil and gas, hydraulic fracturing, and upon processing and approval by the City of applications for permits, licenses, or any other types of land use approvals related to Oil and Gas operations. City staff is directed to refuse to process, review or approve any such applications during the moratorium.
- Section 3. Investigation and Evaluation. During the moratorium, City and County staff, working with the City and County Attorney, shall investigate and evaluate the regulatory authority of the City over Oil and Gas operations, including traffic impacts, including the impact of applicable court rulings and proposed state rules and regulations, and determine whether the regulations should be changed or updated. Specifically, staff should also review the agreement with Sovereign Operating Company, to determine if any adjustments to the applicable guidelines and requirements therein should be updated or clarified.
- Section 4. Police Power Finding. The City Council hereby finds, determines and declares that this Ordinance is necessary and proper to provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity, and improve the order, comfort, and convenience of the City and County of Broomfield and the inhabitants thereof.
- Section 5. Authority. The City Council hereby finds, determines and declares that it has the power to adopt this Ordinance pursuant to: (i) the Local Government Land Use Control Enabling Act, Article 20 of Title 29 C.R.S.; (ii) Part 3 of Article 23 of Title 31, C.R.S. (concerning municipal zoning powers); (iii) C.R.S. § 31-15-103, (concerning municipal police powers); (iv) C.R.S. § 31-15-501 (concerning municipal power to regulate businesses); (vi) the authority granted to home rule municipalities by Article XX of the Colorado Constitution; (vii) the powers contained in the Broomfield Home Rule Charter (the "Charter"); and C.R.S. 12-43.3-202.
